Prime Minister congratulates BMRA on centenary year

The secretariat has received a letter from the Prime Minister who took the opportunity to recognise the valuable contributions the Association has made to the development of Government policy over the years. In particular, our "input to the recycling and waste policy. including matters related to end-oflife vehicles and the Government's Resources and Waste Strategy".

Mrs May said: "Recycling makes an important contribution to the UK economy and to the environment. Metals recycling in particular has helped to ensure that we can build our manufacturing economy and export

One hundred years ago, the National Federation of Scrap Iron and Steel Merchants, a predecessor of one of

the bodies that formed the BMRA, was established to address changes after World War I that were to significantly increase the impact of government

on business In the following years, several differen trade bodies representing different metal types (ferrous and non-ferrous) as well as different areas in the UK were set up. BMRA itself was formed in 2001 when the British Secondary Metals Association and the British Metal Federation merged in order to better serve the rapidly changing industry.

Since those early days in 1919, the industry has faced a host of socioeconomic, historical and legislative quidance regarding new acceptance events, including: the Great Depression; the national salvage campaign of WW2; the Scrap Metal Dealers Acts 1964 and 2013: and, the Air Weapons Licensing (Scotland) Act.

There will be opportunities to celebrate the centenary with fellow members throughout the year. We look forward to seeing you at the AGM, Golf Day and Summer Dinner on 25 June. the Annual Dinner on 22 November, and


